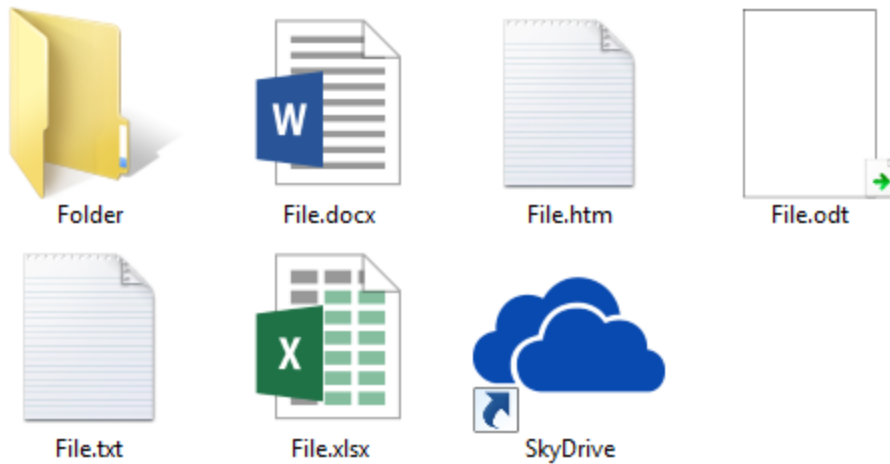


Files and Folders

What is a file? Are they all the same? What is a folder? Can I have more than one folder inside a folder? What about libraries? Do they have books I can borrow? (just kidding!). How do I copy files and folders or move them from one place to another? Can I name them whatever I like? Can I change the name later if I don't like what I originally said? How does the computer know which program to open when I double-click on a file? How can I see those hidden file extensions?

Files are actual objects stored on your hard drive (or flash drive, external drive, CD, etc). They are defined by the extension associated with them. That is the 3 or 4 characters to the right of the dot after the actual name.

Files can be named with one or more “words”. But you have to be careful about the characters you use. I try to limit mine to letter, numbers, and dashes. If you include a date in the filename be sure to use dashes and not slashes. Slashes in a file name take on a whole new meaning. In Windows upper and lower case characters do not matter.

So files take space on the drive. They may be fragmented, but when accessed they are put back together for use.

Folders are containers used to organize files and other folders. For example, there is a folder named Windows where all the operating system files are located. And another called Program Files where all non-Windows programs are kept. A special one named Desktop contains all the data you see on your desktop.

Libraries do not contain anything at all. They are simply ways to group folders for easy access. For example, say you have a few places that contain images (pictures). You can create a library name My Images and when you open that library you will see the folders that contain images.

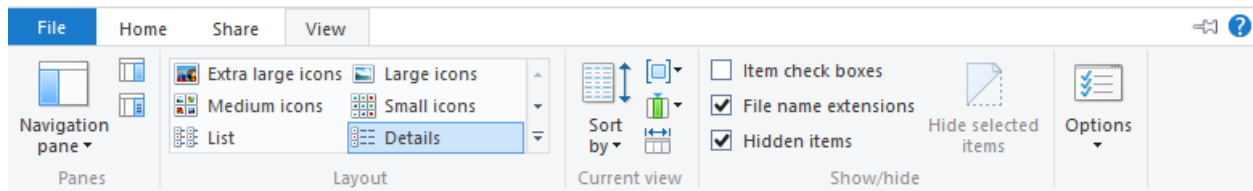
Windows comes with a number of libraries already established for you.

If you let Windows save files without doing any organization, all documents will end up in Documents, images in Pictures, and downloads from the Internet in Downloads. This is fine until you want to locate a file or group of files.

I just finished publishing a book on Amazon and Kindle. I ended up with over a dozen files associated with that project. Had I not saved them in a folder specifically for that book it would be impossible to gather them all together later. I would have to search one at a time to locate them.



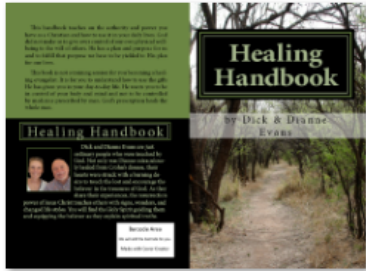
To open Windows Explorer (NOT Internet Explorer), click the picture of a folder on the left of the taskbar. Then click on Documents to see a list of all your folders and files within the Document folder.



There are six types of View you can choose from.

Details gives you the most information including dates and size of the files.

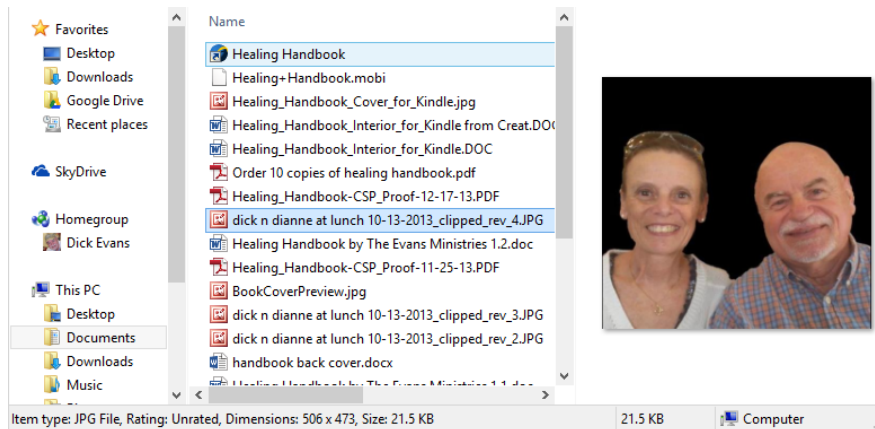

Extra large icons is nice for image folders as you can see what the image looks like. Keep the check mark on File name extensions so you can see what they are.



If you click Alt+P you can toggle the Preview pane.

You can change the name of any file or folder by right-clicking on it and typing a new name. Be very careful not to change the file extension when you change a file name. The extension tells Windows what program to use to open the file. Each program automatically saves the file with the correct extension for that program. Word creates a DOCX extension. You can also click the file or folder name and then press F2.

You can copy any file or folder by right-clicking on it and selecting Copy. Then open the folder you want to place it in and right-click and Paste. You can also drag files from one place to another by opening two Explorer windows. Use Win+E to open a second window. When you drag a file/folder from one location to another it is Moved. If you want to copy the file/folder hold the Ctrl key down while you drag and you will see a + sign appear. This indicates that the operation is a copy rather than a move. If you are copying from one disk drive to another (like a USB drive) dragging automatically copies.

I suggest right-dragging as it gives you a choice to Copy, Move, or Create a shortcut.
